Chair's Report

This has been a particularly challenging year when Families Outside took two significant steps that reflected their strong and successful growth – a major business restructuring, and relocation of the head office in Edinburgh.

Discussions between the Trustees and senior managers came to the conclusion that the existing structure was no longer the best one for achieving our strategic aims. It took a huge effort amongst all the staff to make the changes and realign the structure to fit the three strategic aims of direct support and information; awareness raising and policy influencing; and business effectiveness. After much internal discussion and some external help, the new structure was agreed, roles clarified, and posts filled. All was ready to go live on 1 April - though some follow-up recruitment had to wait until the resources were assured.

The office relocation proceeded in parallel. Thus, in time for the start of the new business year, two major transformations were in place, and Families Outside was in great shape to move ahead. Then came COVID-19, and everything changed. However, the reorganisation went ahead except everyone had to start working from home and still deliver services that were more needed than ever - more of that next year.

For now, I want to say thank you and congratulations to Nancy and the whole staff team for an amazingly successful year, rising to new challenges and continuing to provide excellent services and influence. The Trustees are especially pleased that all was achieved within the budget, even the costs of the move. This reflects the strong standing we enjoy with funders and careful stewardship of our resources.

Chief Executive's Report

2019-20 has been a year of considerable change for Families Outside. We have matured as an organisation, which has required redevelopment to ensure we have the infrastructure to support the work we do; and a move for our head office from the space originally rented for four of us, to a space able to accommodate the 20+ staff, student placements, and volunteers now based there.

Such processes are not always painless, but in keeping with their character, the staff rallied admirably and have moved forward with creativity and enthusiasm. The introduction of our first Policy & Parliamentary Officer enabled an improved focus on policy change as well as better engagement with staff and families for this. Our office move in December, while disruptive, nevertheless breathed new life into the Head Office, providing muchneeded additional space and, with it, new energy and opportunities. We were able to recruit and accept social work student placements for the first time and to host a number of volunteers.

The lockdown restrictions have of course altered our work considerably, especially in combination with the other major changes Families Outside introduced over the course of the year. Again, our team adapted admirably, implementing homebased working without any loss of direct support to families, and introducing new means of delivering training and group work. Demand for our input has increased dramatically, with all staff engaged in addressing this.

I am pleased to share our progress over 2019-20 with you in this report. Families Outside can only achieve its outcomes through devoted and hard-working staff and volunteers as well as a tremendously well-qualified and supportive Board. We are also grateful for the continued interest and support of our funders; of the many agencies we work alongside; and especially of the families who share their experiences and expertise with us. Our work would not be possible without you.



Research & Publications

We published new research looking at the specific and significant issues families face regarding Travel, Transport, and Visiting. We also published two new editions of our In Brief series – the first one on contact with siblings in prison, and one on the 'cost' of imprisonment for families in terms of perceptions of legitimacy and justice.

Influencing Change

We develop policy and practice along with a number of national and local partners as well as internationally through our membership of Children of Prisoners Europe (COPE) and the International Coalition for Children of Incarcerated Parents (INCCIP). During 2019/20, our policy highlights include recruiting a dedicated Policy and Parliamentary Officer and increasing our work with Community Justice Partnerships to share knowledge and ensure families' voices are heard at a local level.



15 Consultations

Families Outside contributed to 15 consultations carried out by the Scottish Government, Parliamentary Committees, and external organisations, ensuring that families' voices are heard.

Parliamentary Cross-Party Groups




